



## A SPLENDID FAIR.

If Good Weather Had Prevailed It Would Have Been Biggest Ever Held At Piedmont Park.

Horse Show Yesterday Was Quite a Success—There Were a Good Many Entries—Show People And Others Have Been Leaving Today.—Fair Association Not Discouraged But Will Formulate Plans Soon for Next Year's Fair.

President Tom H. Hamer, of the Forsyth County Fair Association, says that while the expenses of the fair this week were larger than the receipts, the association proposes to pay premiums and meet all other obligations.

While the weather was disappointing, the fair management is by no means disengaged. It was decided to make extensive improvements at Piedmont park and to give a fair next year that will be a credit not only to Winston-Salem and Forsyth, but to the entire Piedmont section. The association will probably hold a meeting at an early date to discuss plans for the future.

### The Horse Show.

The exhibition of fine horses was the big feature of the closing day of the fair. The first event was a display of double carriage teams. W. A. Linville's dark bay geldings captured the first prize, while a splendid pair owned by Smoak & McCready took second. O. L. Fisher's fine pair of brown animals was awarded third.

There were about ten entries in the double teams in light harness.

H. B. James, with a pair of standard seal brown horses, caught the judges' fancy and the blue ribbon was pinned to his bridle. Smoak & McCready's red sorrel was decorated with the red and O. L. Fisher, with a pair of handsome whites took third prize.

Following was a fine display of single driving horses. For this event there were about fifteen entries, the first prize winner being a beautiful bay mare owned by W. N. Reynolds. Dr. W. G. Crawford's beautiful steel gray was the second favorite and Geo. F. Dwire's black "Jewell" third.

In the saddle horse exhibit there were twelve entries and all of them were beauties. H. B. James' fine Kentucky saddle mare, ridden by Johnnie James, was an easy winner.

There was a creditable exhibit of draught horses. The big black team used by the Salem fire department was the first choice, while honors were divided between teams owned by A. C. Vogler & Son, Oakland Furniture Co. and the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

There were ten entries for the combination saddle and harness horse and John James, on his handsome bay mare, secured the blue ribbon. A chestnut sorrel horse, owned by Mrs. R. J. Reynolds and handled by J. B. McCready, took the red, leaving the white for a sorrel horse owned by H. B. James.

The pretty little ponies owned by F. J. Lipford Jr. and James K. Norfleet, Jr., were shown and received first and second favors in the order named.

### Two Races.

The gentlemen's road race and a couple of half mile dashes by runners closed the great day. For the first there were six entries. Casper Bitting's brown horse, Cheap John; George Andre's bay trotter, Jimmie; Will Burton's brown mare, Jolly Boy. The race was the best two in three, which Jolly Boy won with Will Burton's brown trotter, second.

In the half mile dashes the starters were Sylvan Bell, Acceleration, Accelaration and Allurement, all running in the order named in the first race. The time was 52 seconds. In the second race the same horses ran in the same order only adding Ayasta, which came in fifth.

### 15 DEAD IN NEW MEXICO MINE.

Fatal Explosion in Which All the Night Shift Are Supposed to Have Lost Their Lives.

RATON, N. M., Oct. 6.—Fifteen men are reported to have lost their lives in an explosion today in the Dutchman Coal Mine, at Bloomsburg, a small camp five miles from Raton. Three bodies have been recovered.

The cause of the explosion is not known. The mine is owned and operated by the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain and Pacific Company and well equipped with all modern electrical appliances.

The night shift of 15 men was working when the explosion occurred.

## NEW CRUISER NORTH CAROLINA LAUNCHED

Ceremonies At Newport News Attendant Upon This Event Today Witnessed By Large Crowd, the Occasion Being Successful In Every Respect—New Ship Christened By Miss Rebeckah Glenn, Daughter of Governor Glenn.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Oct. 6.

The launching here this morning of the splendid United States cruiser North Carolina attracted a very large crowd, many spectators coming from the Old North State.

Work was suspended in the shipyards today and altogether the day was one of the biggest in the history of Newport News. Special trains were run and reduced rates were offered by the railroads.

The North Carolina was christened by Miss Rebeckah Glenn, the charming daughter of the governor of North Carolina. The ceremony went off in good shape without a hitch. When the vessel had been christened a great shout went up from the assembled crowd. The occasion was a thoroughly successful one in every respect.

The North Carolina is a splendid cruiser of the newest type and will prove a formidable addition to the

fighting force of the United States navy. The ship will be completed in a few months and ready for active service.

Ten thousand people witnessed the launching exercises.

One hundred people were seated on the stand. Among these were Governor and Mrs. Glenn, members of the governor's staff in uniform, officers of navy, Miss Rebeckah Williams Glenn, the sponsor; Miss Little Thompson, her maid of honor, and Mrs. A. H. Atkinson.

When all was in readiness, General Manager Paul of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co., gave the signal. Miss Glenn stepped forward and said, "Christen the North Carolina."

After the exercises had been finished Governor Glenn and his party were driven over to town. Then the governor and family were guests of honor at the home of President Wallwood, of the shipbuilding company.
