BAD FREIGHT WRECK NEAR DANVILLE, VA.

DANVILLE, Va., Oct. 2.—Twelve cars of a freight train were wrecked yesterday afternoon near Dry Fork. The cars were loaded with merchandise and the wreck is one of the worst that has occurred on the Southern for months and entails a heavy loss and seriously interfered with traffic. The derailed cars were in the middle of the train, and the engine with four cars was cut loose from the train and proceeded on to Dry Fork. Four other rear cars were left standing on the track. The wrecked cars were badly smashed up and piled in one congested heap. Some of the cars were completely turned over, while others were standing on their sides. The track was torn up for a distance of over a hundred yards. The crew escaped injury except Conductor Davidson, who was in charge. Mr. Davidson was injured about the back, but not seriously hurt. The fact that more were not injured and there were no fatalities was probably due to the wrecked cars being in the middle of the train. No other theory otherwise than that of the spreading of rails is given for the cause.
