## AYCOCK AT ASHEVILLE.

Ex-Governor Aycock, in his speech at Asheville Thursday night said:

"My friends, we are right on every and national issues and right on everything except when we get scared. But the Radicals the state never trusted. They went in on bayonets in 1878. What did they do? Marion has broken up everything he has joined and I am glad he is with the Radicals, because you know what will happen." (Tremendous applause.)
