PRESIDENT WILL NOT VISIT NEW ORLEANS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Although he will remain within a few hours of New Orleans, President Roosevelt will not be able to visit the Gulf City on his forthcoming visit to Panama—a trip he has already extended to a call at Porto Rico. Insurgent harbor facilities will prevent his battleship Louisiana from approaching the metropolis of the State for which it is named. This is the belief of the Insurgent Corps of the War Department, which is conducting an investigation.

The President is reported to be anxious to take in New Orleans on his way to the isthmus. It is reported here that New Orleans, if all the big cities, will reap the greatest benefit by the opening of the big canal, and for that reason a journey to be able to see the big ditch should include that part. The shallow waters, however, may not be the President's wishes and plans at naught.

Timely Warning Se n. Although this unexpected turn of affairs looks disappointing for the Insurgent Executive and for the people of the Gulf coast, it is recognized here that it holds a timely lesson for the nation at large and for the people of the State in particular. If the nation is to benefit by the opening of the Panama Canal, it would seem that more activity is imperative in the betterment of harbors and in the development of coast. If such work is not undertaken and pressed so that it will have a chance to be carried out by the time the Panama waterway is opened to commerce, England and Germany will be enabled to first to the new field of trade then opened.

Secretary Paul is said to have been astounded in his recent trip to South America, by the marvelous grip the British and Germans have on trade in that territory. His capture of business in that territory was because the transportation of British and German goods was by water. American goods, it is pointed out, will have to be the freights of their own name. As soon as the works of the nation are developed so that they will permit of ships better built or inferior ports, the vastly rich trade that should have been this nation's prior years and will soon be the exports in figures even less undervalued.

By the time the water is through the canal, they have been growing in favor of an annual appropriation by Congress of \$10,000,000 for the great internal work. Congressman Rindall, of Louisiana, at the present time is urging the people of the Middle West to bring pressure to bear on their representatives, and the South will be invited to do the same.

Ports in Soiry Shape. The harbors of the country, which include the finest in the world so far as natural advantages are concerned, are in sorry shape. New York swayed a few weeks ago to the fact that the two gigantic liners building in England could not hope to get nearer the docks than Sandy Hook. Now comes this example of New Orleans to keep step with the times, and all because Congress fails to make adequate monetary provision.

The President will have for the autumn in a few weeks. His decision to visit Porto Rico was reached yesterday, and he will spend November 22 and 23 in San Juan on his way home.
