### SPAIN REBUILDING HER NAVY RAPIDLY

(Special to The Sentinel)  
LONDON, Oct. 28.—Spain is making rapid progress with the rebuilding of her navy. The expenditure, about £10,000,000, authorized by the Spanish Parliament, is being laid out under a construction program of 10 years. It comprises eight ironclad battleships, three cruisers, and seven smaller vessels. Half the ships will be built in Spanish yards, and the rest in foreign countries. The expenditure now under way includes reorganization and completion of the armada, docks and yards at Ferrol, Cartagena and Cadiz, and the protection cruiser Reina Regente, which has just been signed.

London's electrical power plant for the Reina Regente, now nearing completion at Ferrol, shows that Spain intends to make her new warships as much up-to-date as possible. Old-style broadside guns had been provided for, but when the Spaniards found out about the new method of shelling water-tight doors, an electrical change was promptly made. The power plant, known as the "Armada" system, are the invention of an American naval officer, and are installed on nearly all the new ships of the American navy. The object is to make ships unsinkable. In this case of the Queen Regente, it is important, in time of emergency, to cut off electrical current, so that the power plant does not burn.

According to latest information Spain has 16 commissioned three or four class battleships, four armoured cruisers, thirty-three second and third class cruisers, nine frigates, gunboats, thirty-two gunboats, five destroyers, thirteen torpedo boats, and twenty-five miscellaneous vessels. By the time the program now being carried out is completed she will have brought her navy up to such formidable proportions that it will have to be considered as an important factor in the balance of Europe's sea-power.
