**Southern Prosperity.**

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 2.—Cotton exports for the Southern States for the past four years have reached a total of \$11,400,717,392. From 1888 to 1896, inclusive, the valuation figures 12,000,000,000, which was \$677,286,582, or 5.9 per cent, more than the total of 11,122,713,308. The enormous value of cotton to the South can be easily estimated from the fact that it produces more than 250,000,000 acres of cotton in the United States. When being handled on the coast, it is worth \$1.00 per bale. The possibilities embraced in this vast resource are considered with the iron and coal and mineral resources that are now yielding to the touch of the digger, the future of the South seems assured.
