INCENDIARY FIRES

A Band of Fire-Bugs Believed to Be Operating in New York.

A Number of Fires Started in Last Few Days Under Very Suspicious Circumstances Leads to Conviction That Fire Fiends Are At Work in Metropolis—A Woman Among Those Implicated.

(By Publishers' Press.) NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—A gang of fire fiends is terrorizing New York. Three incendiary fires on one block on Twenty-fifth street last night following five attempts to destroy houses on West Sixth and Sixty-first streets earlier in the day have convinced the police that a gang of fire-bugs is at work.
