**WILL BOTH REVENUE DISTRICTS BE UNITED?**

According to a report, which emanates from Asheville, the Fifth or Western internal revenue district is to be abolished and all of the revenue business of the State is to be transferred to Raleigh, with Mr. Duncan as collector.

For sometime there has been talk that the collector's office might be moved from Asheville, but nothing was said about consolidation. The home of the new collector, Mr. Brown, is at Statesville, and of course he would prefer, for personal reasons at least, to have the office there. Winston-Salem asked for the office, her plea being that as this place pays into the coffers of the U. S. treasury about three-fourths of the revenue collected in the district, the Twin-City was entitled to it—saying nothing of the convenience that would accrue to those who buy stamps, etc.

The Asheville News-Gazette has a story to the effect that "a man favorable to Blackburn was made collector and the Butler people would rather see the office abolished and combined with the eastern district, which is said to be favored by some of the officials of the internal revenue department at Washington, if they cannot control the appointments."

"Continuing that paper says: 'With Duncan as the sole collector and chief patronage dispenser in the State there would be established the close political cooperation which is so desirable. There would then be an absolutely centralized form of G. O. P. government, for under the ideal arrangement Butler and Duncan would be in absolute control. The east would then control the whole State without a dissenting voice.'

"Republicans of the west, and particularly those of this section where under normal conditions there is a Republican party, are to be punished for going to a Republican convention of the State against the Butler band of patronage dispensers, who won out at Greensboro by manipulating the delegates from the sullen Democratic east. It has been frequently asserted that something will drop in the revenue circles within the next sixty days, and many believe that when the drop comes it will mean the consolidation of the two revenue districts with a Butler man at the helm. It is believed his program will be carried out unless the president makes a too close examination of the returns from the State at the last election, and is set to thinking by the fall-down of the Butler crowd."
