COMING MARRIAGE IN GREENSBORO

GREENSBORO, Dec. 11.—The marriage of Miss Cora Cox, of this city, and the Rev. Crawford Jackson, of Atlanta, Ga., chairman of the Central Juvenile Protective Committee, will take place in the parlor of West Market Street M. E. church on the afternoon of Thursday, December 27, at 4:30 o'clock. This marriage will be the culmination of a brief and unusual romance. The engagement is the result of a congeniality discovered first in the deep interest that both manifested in juvenile reform work, and leading through this and other association, in which they found that high regard and esteem that is the basis of matrimony.

The Rev. Mr. Jackson came to Greensboro a few weeks ago in the interest of the Juvenile Protective and also visited other places in the State. Here he organized the Guilford County Association of the Juvenile Protective, the organization having for its purpose the securing of legislation providing for the establishment of a juvenile court and the probate system.

Miss Cox was graduated from the State Normal and Industrial College six years ago and afterwards took a special course in the University of Chicago to better fit herself for the work of teaching. She has for a number of years been a teacher in the South Greensboro graded school. Miss Cox is a member of the church of the Friends, and her pastor, the Rev. Dr. J. Edward Williams, will assist the Rev. Dr. G. H. Detweiler, pastor of West Market Street church. After the wedding a reception will be tendered at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Cox in this city, after which they will go to Atlanta, their future home.

At the home of the Rev. Mr. Jackson, in Atlanta, on the evening of the 25th, a reception will be given to a number of friends, in which a program full of interest to juvenile workers will be carried out.

The Rev. Mr. Jackson is a Georgian by birth, but he received his collegiate training in Mississippi University, at which place he graduated with honors in 1881. The year of his graduation he entered the South Carolina Conference, and after four years was transferred to the North Georgia Conference, with which he has been identified for the past 16 years. For a number of years he has devoted his time exclusively to juvenile reform work.
