NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—One of the guests of President Roosevelt is today quoted as saying that the president is still firmly determined not to accept another nomination. The statement is added that possibly his enemies might do something to induce him to run again but not otherwise. Roosevelt is quoted as saying that he still regards Taft as the leading candidate but recognizes the growth of the Hughes boom.
