Nebraska Legislature Democratic. LINCOLN, Nov. 4.—While returns are meagre the indications are that the Democrats will have a majority on joint ballot in the legislature. A movement was started today to elect William Jennings Bryan to the United States senate. Bryan asserted both on the stump and in letters that he had rather be senator than president.

EARLY RETURNS.

Results in Various States Indicated by News Received This Morning. Below are given some of the election ballistics received early this morning, these giving a pretty good idea of the trend of voting in various states:

NEW YORK. Indications point to majority for Taft of about 200,000 and also the election of Hughes by smaller majority.

MAINE. Portland, Maine—Returns thus far show that Taft has carried this State by 30,000.

TENNESSEE. Nashville—Returns thus far received show that Bryan has carried the State, but by a reduced majority.

OKLAHOMA. Guthrie, Okla.—Bryan has carried this State by 30,000, based on estimates received thus far.

NEW JERSEY. TRENTON—Indications are that Taft has carried New Jersey by 30,000.

MARYLAND. Baltimore—Returns received at 8 o'clock last night indicate that Democrats have elected seven congressmen and the Republicans one.

MASSACHUSETTS. Boston—The Globe Democrat says Taft has carried Massachusetts by 100,000 majority and Draper, Republican is elected governor by 75,000.

INDIANA. Indianapolis—At 10 o'clock the indications are that Taft has carried Indiana by 30,000.

NEW HAMPSHIRE. Concord—Taft carries New Hampshire by 20,000.

MICHIGAN. Detroit—Taft carries Michigan by a large majority.

GEORGIA. Savannah—Bryan has carried the State, but Taft and Watson got a big vote.

CONNECTICUT. New Haven—Taft carries Connecticut by 25,000. Republican governor and all five congressmen re-elected.

SOUTH CAROLINA. Columbia—South Carolina gives Bryan a majority of 60,000. State and congressional Democratic tickets elected.

PENNSYLVANIA. Philadelphia—The indications are

that Pennsylvania has gone Republican by 200,000.

FLORIDA. Jacksonville—Democrats carry the State by reduced majority.

OHIO. Cincinnati—Hamilton county shows Ohio will give Taft a majority of 100,000, perhaps more.

SOUTH DAKOTA. CHICAGO—Indications are that Taft has carried South Dakota by 15,000.

ILLINOIS. Returns received thus far show the election of 14 Democrats and 17 Republicans to Congress in this State. Chicago—At 11 o'clock estimated plurality of Taft is 200,000 in Illinois.

VIRGINIA. NORFOLK—Republican State Chairman concedes Virginia to Bryan by 15,000. He claims Republicans elected one congressman.

DELAWARE. DOVER—Indications are Taft's majority in Delaware will be 2500.

NORTH DAKOTA. FARGO—Indications received thus far indicate Taft has carried North Dakota.

MINNESOTA. ST. PAUL—Republican State Chairman Brown claims the State for Taft by 150,000.

NEW JERSEY. TRENTON—Taft's majority in New Jersey will be 45,000. The legislature will be Republican by big majority.

KANSAS. TOPEKA—Returns indicate that Kansas gives her vote to Taft by 16,000 majority.

IOWA. DES MOINES—The first six precincts heard from show very heavy Bryan gains.

MISSOURI. St. Louis—Bryan has carried Missouri from all indications.

WISCONSIN. Milwaukee—In 165 precincts out of 124 in the city give 18761 and Taft 19,722. This is a considerable Republican loss.

UTAH. Salt Lake City—Returns indicate that Taft has carried Utah by 10,000.

TEXAS. Dallas—Texas gives Bryan and the entire Democratic ticket a majority of over 100,000.

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DEMOCRATS CLAIM ELECTION OF 5 NOMINEES IN FORSYTH.

These are Sheriff, Treasurer, Two County Commissioners and Coroner—Republicans Get the Rest.

Latest returns from the various precincts of the county indicate the Democrats have elected five of their nominees in Forsyth. These are Sheriff Ziegler, Treasurer Beck, Messrs. Cline and Moir, candidates for county commissioner, and Dr. W. N. Dalton, candidate for coroner.

The Republicans deny that the Democrats have elected two county commissioners and the coroner. It will require the official count to determine the exact result.

Democrats Carry The State By Safe Majority

Kitchin's Majority is About 40,000—Hackett Probably Defeated in Eighth—Brooks and Crawford Are in Danger.

North Carolina is Democratic by from 32,000 to 45,000 is the last phone message from Raleigh received about noon. It is thought the regular Democratic state ticket except governor will have about 46,000 and that Bryan will have 32,000.

The legislature is Democratic in both branches though the House of Representatives is close. It seems certain that Hackett is defeated, but Crawford is thought to be elected. Brooks and Morehead are running neck and neck in his district.

While Democrats have lost ground in Rockingham, Forsyth, Wilkes, Orange, Montgomery, Davidson, Buncombe, Stanly, Cabarrus, Wake and Chatham, they have made gains in New Hanover, Bladen, Columbus, Union, Anson, Mecklenburg, Catawba, Halifax, Johnston, Wayne and Wilson. Ashe county is Democratic by from 50 to 175, giving Hackett 75 majority. Alamance is Democratic except for Morehead by 56 and the Republican member who is re-elected to the house.

Ex-Speaker Samuel M. Gattis is defeated in Orange and that county has gone Republican. Durham county has gone Democratic all the way up to 650, but vote between Morehead and Brooks is close.

In Surry Morehead has a majority of 550 but C. H. Haynes claims his election over Davis, Republican, for sheriff.

Chairman Eller over the phone as we go to press is still claiming the state by 40,000 majority.

Brooks May Be Defeated. Much interest is being manifested by both Democrats and Republicans here regarding the result of the contest in the Fifth congressional district. Mr. Brooks and his managers are claiming his election by a majority of 500 or more. On the other hand the Republicans are contending that when the official figures are in they will show Mr. Morehead's election by a small majority. Judging from reports received by The Sentinel today it will require the official count to decide who has been chosen congressman from this district.

A message from Greensboro states that the Republicans spent large sums of money in every county in the district. It is presumed that Mr. Morehead put up a good amount of it. Returns have been coming in unusually slow to Mr. Brooks' headquarters in Greensboro. A telephone message from the Greensboro Record says that while no official figures are obtainable, it is known that the race between Messrs. Brooks and Morehead will be close. The Democratic candidate's majority in Guilford will not be over 400 or 700, while the Democratic county ticket will have majorities ranging from 1,000 to 1,400. Mr. Brooks' majority in Durham county was only 26. It is estimated that he lost Rockingham by 100, Surry by 550 and Stokes by 600. His estimated majority in Granville is 600 and in Caswell 400.

Later—Vote in State. Democratic State Chairman Eller says all indications point to a larger Democratic vote in the state than four years ago. The majority is smaller because more Republicans voted than for eight years. There is no satisfactory evidence of less than forty thousand majority.

There have been some losses and some gains. Possibly ten members of the House and three of the Senate are lost. The Democrats appear to have gained one member each in Dare, Pamlico, McDowell and possibly Clay and Graham. Democratic legislative losses are in Rockingham, Forsyth, Orange, Davidson, Cabarrus and Buncombe.

Chairman Eller says it is evident Republicans concentrated effort in closest counties, especially on the legislative ticket. The Democrats lost no county where former majorities were considered safe.

Meagre reports received today show Rutherford is 325 Democratic; Caldwell 100 Republican; Bladen 500 Democratic; Rowan 600 Democratic; Halifax 2,000 Democratic; Ashe 51 Democratic with Hackett 75.

Chairman Eller says indications are hopeful yet that Democrats have elected congressmen in both eighth and tenth districts, as well as the fifth.

"The heir has succeeded to the kingdom," is the way the Standard puts it. The Mail Gazette congratulates America and says Taft will be Roosevelt's man.
