**Nickle in North Carolina.**

Much has been said lately, said Major E. Willis yesterday, in the newspapers about the alleged discovery of nickle ore in Virginia. It is probable, however, that reference is had to North Carolina, where I am reliably informed nickle ores are to be found equal to any in Ludbury, Canada, and only excelled by the New Caledonian deposits. The North Carolina ore analyzes 11 to 32 per cent in metallic nickle. The deposits are in Jackson county, N. C., near Webster, and four miles from the Western North Carolina Railroad. The mine is said to have an almost inexhaustible deposit of chronic iron analyzing about 55 per cent of chronic ore. There is no reason why the United States supply of nickle should not come from North Carolina. The mine yields a million pounds of nickle ore.
