Commissioners Proceedings.

The following claims were allowed: F. B. Hendren, posting quarantine posters, \$3.50; B. S. Call, assignee for Calvin Hendrix for building stock-law fence, \$11.45; B. S. Call, assignee of J. A. Keys for building fence, \$12.56; R. M. Johnson, laying off road, \$1; Dr. J. W. White, services to a case of smallpox, \$30.50; Wilson Hendrix, work on stock-law fence, \$4; L. M. McGlamery, conveying Celia Barnes to her home in Ashe county, \$6; C. A. Wyatt, conveying, and expenses incurred, prisoners to jail, \$3; J. L. Webster, iron work on jail windows, \$9; W. G. Hall, work on stock law fence, \$15; James Wallace, building stockade for his idiotic son, \$4; J. L. Turner, coffin for pauper, \$2; Laura Laws was allowed \$9, temporary relief; C. W. Cheek, stock law fence commissioner, \$8; J. H. Johnson, summoning jury for term of court, \$7.20; J. H. Johnson, services as jailer during May, \$14.95; Betsy Foster, temporary relief \$1; L. D. Triplett, work on stock-law fence, \$30.00; E. M. Blackburn, clerk for county board, \$0.70.

Taxes were levied for the year 1900 as follows:

State purposes,	21

Under Schedule B and C the county levies the same amount as the State except when provided.

A levy of 25 cents on the one hundred dollars' worth of real estate was made on the said property in following stock-law territory: Edwards, Traphill, Mulberry, Book Creek, Walnut Grove and the Lewis Fork territory.

Lafayette Summerlin's allowance was increased to 2.00. Eli Phillips, Mahala Summerlin and Caleb Church were declared paupers and each allowed 1.01.

J. S. Wadkins was exempted from poll tax on account of eye-sight failure. L. W. Canter and A. N. Elledge were exempted on account of infirmity.

W. V. Triplett was attached to Beaver Creek township by request.

The petition filed by J. M. German and others, asking for a discontinuance of the Beaver Creek road from T. H. Parsons' gate to the Burke road and to declare the Gunter Hill road from Parsons' gate via Carlton's mill to the Burke road, was granted.

E. M. Absher's road report was approved.

The petition of A. N. Profit and others, asking for a public road from the lower end of said Profit's field to the mouth of Masters branch, crossing Elk Creek and running through the lands of Thos. and Jno. Dula, will be heard at next meeting.

The petition of G. L. Smbot and others, asking for certain territory to be declared stock-law territory, was granted and allowed to erect a good gate across the road at some convenient place.
