Sparks, or his liquor, seemed to have a hankering for talking and he began to argue the case with his Honor. Judge Lyons acted in a very polite manner with Sparks but he insisted on talking, and he was locked up for 30 days for contempt of court.

Late yesterday afternoon Sparks sobered up and was turned loose. The action and the way in which the Judge handled Sparks, giving him every chance possible to get out and stop talking, was very commendable.
