## Yadkinville 35 Years Ago

It was during the memorable campaign of the year 1876 that we left the yardstick on the counter of what was then the old Cowles store house in Yadkinville and hid us away to the old farm to join the great army of producers and to wed ourselves to a life of toil, corn bread, fat-back and patched breeches. And as we have spent our life within a radius of three miles of the place we justly feel that we have a right to claim citizenship, and we love the old place because it is the spot that gave us birth, and our early ties are here. Yadkinville was then but a mere hamlet, yet in swaddling clothes, so to speak, but today she is fast dawning the habiliments of a full grown youngster and preparing to take her place among the busy places of the world.

Great changes have come and we are greeted on every hand by strange faces. Of what was then, but little remains today, and it is with a tinge of sadness that we pass the streets of Yadkinville today and meet so few of our friends of "Ye olden time." Most of them have passed over to the great silent majority, while the remainder with a few exceptions are scattered to the four winds of the earth, all of which reminds us that this world is indeed but a fleeting show and things are swiftly passing and the few of us left are hastening into the serene and yellow leaf. As we approach with almost reverential tread the dear old spot that was once the happy home of our boyhood days, what memories it stirs within our breast, many of them pleasant some otherwise. It was here the widowed mother worked and toiled that the orphan boy might go to school it was here that we began to face life in its sternest aspect and the cares and hardships of life to press heavily on the youthful shoulders. With what fondness, yea and mingled with sadness too the memory goes back to the days when I roamed your streets a thoughtless barefoot boy. What a change time hath wrought here at the old home, the old building has long been torn away and replaced by a more substantial structure. It is now the home of Mrs. John Q. Holton. My old hearth stone has crumbled, my roof tree vanished, nothing much remains to show me where my home was save the grand old oak just east of the house which yet waves to me a lingering farewell. Woodman spare that tree. In years past and gone it cast its grateful shade and sheltered my defenceless head. O, Yadkinville! My native town the happy home of my boyhood days how I love your borders and when life's fitful dream is over would gladly rest this mortal part among your shady bowers. God bless old Yadkinville. J. ## Quarantine Rules

If a householder or a physician suspects that a person whom he is called to visit is infected with diphtheria, measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever etc., he is hereby empowered and authorized to quarantine the individual of the household according to the quarantine rules and regulations of the State Board of Health and he shall immediately give notice thereof to the quarantine officer. Any physician or householder who violates the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, also shall be liable to a penalty of \$25.00 in favor of any person who shall sue for same.
