being agitated in some sec-
tions and I take this method
of branding same as a mal-
icious, wilful lie, and have
every reason to believe that it
was circulated by competitors
for the simple purpose of dam-
aging my business. So sure
am I of this that I hereby offer
a liberal reward for evi-
dence leading to those who
first stated said reports. Not
only this, but I will also pay
a reward for any of the pro-
ducts of North Wilkesboro
Roller Mills which are adul-
terated. Our mills are always
open to our customers and
those interested, and we here-
by invite all to call around at
any time and familiarize them-
selves with our method of do-
ing business.

In some sections these slan-
derous reports have confused
the Elkin Roller Mills with
those of North Wilkesboro
and my statement in regard to

We desire to call attention

State Normal and Industrial

total enrollment of 909 stu-
dents. Eighty-seven of the
ninety-eight counties of the
State had representatives in the
student body. Nine-tenths
of all the graduates of this in-

now teaching in the schools of
North Carolina.

The dormitories are furnish-
ed by the State and board is
provided at actual cost. Two
hundred appointments with
free tuition, apportioned ac-
cording to school population,
will be awarded to applicants
about the middle of July.
Students who wish to attend
this institution next year
should make application as
early as possible, as the cap-
acity of the dormitories is lim-
ited.
