**GREAT INCREASE IN TAXES OVER 1910**

**Value of Taxable property in Yadkin Shows Gain of \$689,131.**

The assessors for Yadkin County have finished their work and their report shows a large increase in real estate over 1910.  
In 1910 real estate in Yadkin County was valued at \$1,319,648, while the report for 1911 shows it to be \$1,971,203, or an increase of \$651,555.

The total valuation of personal property for 1910 was \$1,133,023, for 1911 it is \$1,170,599, or an increase of \$37,576.

The total valuation of both personal and real property in Yadkin County in 1910 was \$2,452,671, for 1911 it is \$3,141,802, or a total increase of \$689,131.

The increase in taxes for 1911 is \$8,049 68, which is the result of the increase in both personal and real estate.

The report also shows that in 1910 the real estate in this county was only valued at \$186,625 more than personal property, but the increase over these figures this year is very large.

These figures are subject to approval by the Corporation Commission and may be slightly changed, but there will be no material difference. The tax rate that the above is the tax levy for 1910 and may be changed as the levy for 1911 will not be made until August 1.
