## Surry Boy Commits Suicide by Shooting

Rockford, July 24.—Cephus Lane, aged 13, son of J. D. Lane, of route 1, is dead as the result of a gun-shot wound inflicted by his own hand. The story goes that Mr. Lane went to help some of his neighbors thresh grain and left his three little boys to hoe some tobacco. The oldest of the three claimed to be sick and hoed no tobacco during the day. When his father came home at night he punished the child for not working. Tuesday morning the father went away to help thresh again and told the boys again to hoe out the tobacco. Sometime after breakfast the father had occasion to return home and he found that the 2 younger boys were in the field alone. He asked them where their older brother was and they told him that he had gone to the house and claimed that he was not able to work. Mr. Lane started towards the house and the little fellow saw him coming and got the shot gun and ran behind the straw stack and deliberately ended his life by placing the end of the gun against his breast and emptying the contents of the load in his heart.
