Voice of a Citizen

Mr. Editor:
 I have read the proceedings of our last Court in your paper announcing the verdict in the McBride case and giving the complimentary remarks of the Sheriff of Iredell county, as to the treatment of himself and his officers by the officers of this county.
 This sounds very nice but it stood the Sheriff of Iredell in hand to take this position, as he well knew his officers had violated the law, when they invaded the territory of Yadkin county without any authority of law whatever and shot down and arrested a man. This is the reason why he together with two Lawyers from Statesville were here in their defense.
 I desire to say right here, if I had been on that jury I would have convicted the last one of them, or hung that jury until now. It is only in recent years that a blockader of whiskey is considered a great criminal. I remember a few years ago when the best men of our county were engaged in this business, and they were not considered as felons. The most of our business men and property holders of to-day, made their start in life in this business.
 Suppose we reverse the order of things, and a party if Yadkin officers had invaded the sacred territory of Democratic Iredell, and shot without any authority of law, one of her citizens, what would have been the result? I will tell you, they would have been in Statesville jail as soon as they could have been gotten there and there would have been a howl in the Democratic press, of this State, from the mountains to the seashore, demanding punishment to the full extent of the law. This case is unfortunate for our county and brings no good. It makes no difference what McBride's character was he was entitled to the protection of the law. We have just had a visit within the past few days from the officers of Forsyth county, Sheriff Flist and his Deputy Mr. Adams. They were after a young man charged with breaking into stores in Winston-Salem, a much more serious charge than blockading, what did they do? They did nothing but remain here until they could get their papers endorsed by a lawful officer in this county, then they captured their man and took him to Forsyth county. Our Democratic friends are very inconsistent. At one time they advised and wanted the Blockaders to kill the officers, but now they want the officers to kill the Blockaders. Quite a change has come over the spirit of their dreams.
