RINGING WORDS.

The Church, The State and The Mob

Easter Sunday, Rt. Rev. Leo Haid D. D., O. S. B., Bishop of North Carolina, preached a sermon at Belmont N. C. After speaking of the resurrection of Christ as the crowning work of His life, teaching and passion, and holding up Christ as the only foundation of the Church, and regretting the divisions that have sprung up among Christians and of the supreme necessity of recognizing an authority in the church, Bishop Haid said:
"The rejection of authority is not confined to religion, it spreads in every direction. Once God is no longer acknowledged as the great source of all authority; once His Church is no longer obeyed, the bonds which unite Christian society are broken and shattered. The family is the center of society; but behold how children disobey their parents and soon learn to do as they wish or their unbridled passions dictate. They grow to manhood and the idea of obedience to law and authority grows weaker and weaker. Laws are disregarded and in two many cases those who are called upon to enforce the laws are derided, opposed and even murdered. To make matters worse, judges whose lives are devoted to the study of law and justice are abused and their decisions questioned or laughed to scorn. Public efforts are made to fetter their independence by threatening to recall them from office if they refuse to be governed by private interests or the vagaries of changing public opinion. Finally, not their decisions must guide, but the people at large, too often without the least knowledge of law, in the heat of passion, must set aside the sober judgements of our Courts and replace with their own opinions—opinions formed in the heat of controversy and party strife."
"The civilization of mankind, human happiness, all have their source and origin in the teaching of Christ. Reject His authority, the authority of his laws and commands, and you undermine society and by degrees reduce mankind to the same depth of degradation and crime and awful suffering from which Christ redeemed it. Socialism is raising its red flag all over the civilized world. It acknowledges no God, no hereafter, no immortal soul to be saved. It concentrates its whole being into the world—this temporary existence. It hopes for no happiness beyond the grave, hence must have all enjoyment in this world or not at all. It is really paganism returned to drag down Christianity and Christian morality and Christian duty."
Commenting on the above the Charlotte Observer says editorially:

An Interesting Trial
