WILLIAMS ESCAPED WITH A FINE

N. Glenn Williams the Yadkin county distiller, will not serve a penal sentence. Instead he will pay \$800 in court costs immediately and with this requirement met Judge James E. Boyd will impose a fine. Thomas C. Crafts indicted and tried and convicted jointly with Williams was given his freedom.

The case was called for final disposition in the United States court, and after hearing motions of counsel for a new trial, a statement from Williams' counsel, Judge Boyd decreed that N. Glenn Williams should pay the costs of the case within the next few days and upon arranging this stated that he would pass sentence, with a proviso that said sentence should be held in abeyance from term to term, so as to give Williams opportunity to pay the fine, which under the statute cannot be less than \$1,000. Williams' attorneys stated that they could arrange to pay the \$800 in costs within a day or so. Crafts was given his liberty without costs or fine. Both Williams and Crafts were convicted in the Federal Court here two years ago for conspiracy to defraud the government in the purchase of stamps at the Williams postoffice in Yadkin county. Mrs. Crafts was acquitted by the jury which held Mr. Crafts and Mr. Williams guilty.

In passing judgement on N. Glenn Williams, Monday, Judge Boyd spoke with some feeling of the cry which was raised around him for vengeance of a humiliating sort, which meant nothing less than to put Williams in prison stripes. This Judge Boyd declined to do and in giving his reasons, preached a sermon that cut both ways. Williams has been pursued quite relentlessly by political and personal enemies, and being a man of a combative disposition, it was but natural that he should strike back. In doing this, he but invited a compounding of his harassments. There were people in Raleigh during the time the efforts were made to break up Williams, who would have burned him at the stake and who would have danced with joy as he burned. Yet the offense for which Judge Boyd was advised to send him to the penitentiary, was an alleged plot to defraud the government in the purchase of stamps. In this case the prosecution failed to prove conspiracy. The whole prejudice against Williams grew out of his inheritance of the Old Nick Williams whiskey business and his perhaps too persistent efforts to keep it going. But in the face of this prejudice, it must be admitted, as Judge Byrum claimed, that Williams is honest and law-abiding. Nor is there any doubt about the fact that Judge Boyd meant it when he said that if Williams had been convicted of violating internal revenue laws, he would have got the same judgment as others so convicted.

May Establish Dry Prizery

The Farmers Union of Yadkin county are contemplating the erection of a Dry Prizery some where in this county. At their meeting here June 3, a committee was elected to go to Stokes County and investigate the one over there, and the methods employed in running it, and report their findings here at a later meeting, this committee being composed of Messrs. R. M. Fletcher, I. D. Bowman and A. S. Spear.

Another object of this committee is to ascertain whether or not it pays the farmers to pool their tobacco, and this will be the principal thing considered in deciding whether they will establish the prizery in Yadkin or not.
