TAFT IS NOMINATED BY THE REGULARS

Convention Completes Work, Giving President 561 Delegates—Sherman Again Named as His Running Mate—Teddyites Sit in Convention, but Refuse to Vote

Chicago, June 22.—With the party admittedly facing the greatest crisis in its history, William Howard Taft at 9:15 o'clock tonight was re-nominated for President of the United States by the Republican convention.

The revolt of the Roosevelt delegates to the convention was open from the moment the permanent roll containing the names of the contested delegates was approved. Henry J. Allen of Kansas read the "valedictory" statement in behalf of Roosevelt, asking that his name be not presented and that his delegates sit in mute protest against all further proceedings.

A great majority of the Roosevelt delegates from Illinois and all in the Idaho delegation declined to follow the advice of Roosevelt.

The split in the convention was the occasion of no surprise. It was but the fulfillment of the predictions made during the past few days.

The closing scenes of the convention were marked by counter demonstrations for Taft and Roosevelt.

The first test vote after the "valedictory" came on the adoption of the party platform. The affirmative vote was 666 while the Roosevelt delegates present and not voting numbered three hundred and forty-three.

La Follette was placed before the convention, but Roosevelt's wishes were carried out by his followers and they were silent during the call on the states for nominations.

The convention re-nominated James Schoolcraft Sherman for Vice-President. When it became absolutely certain today that Taft would be nominated without difficulty the leaders in control of the convention decided to give him as running mate his companion on the ticket in 1908. All others dropped from the race, and Sherman was the only candidate placed before the convention.

As the convention adjourned the nearly 350 Roosevelt delegates declining to vote hastened away to tender to Roosevelt the nomination of the new party.

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Beats Other Yadkin Man For Children

Some days ago the Landmark clipped from the Winston Republican and published an item to the effect that Mr. T. F. Holcomb, of Cycle, Yadkin county, had been married twice and the two unions had been blessed with a total of 25 children. Mr. White of Yadkin county, was in the Landmark office Saturday and nominated to beat Mr. Holcomb's record. Mr. Francis Gentry, also of Yadkin county, Mr. Gentry is in the neighborhood of 80 years old and has been married three times. All three of his wives were sisters and a total of 27 children were born to the three unions. —Statesville Landmark.

ROOSEVELT NOMINATED BY THIRD PARTY

Chicago, June 22.—Theodore Roosevelt was nominated for president on an independent ticket in the dying hours of the Republican national convention in which he met defeat. The followers of Roosevelt gathered in Orchestra Hall and pledged their support to the former President.

Roosevelt in accepting the nomination tonight, said that he did so with the understanding that he would willingly step aside if it should be the desire of the new party, when organized, to select another standard bearer.

The police had difficulty in handling the throng that went to the hall. Governor Johnson of California presided.
