Sore Mouth In Cattle, Or "Stomatitis"

The Cause: The disease is the result of cattle eating feed containing irritating fungi or mould. This mould is frequently found in the pastures in unusually hot, wet seasons and immediately after-the heat and moisture being conducive to its growth and de velopment.

symptoms noticed would be dripping of saliva from the mouths, disinclination to eat and drink, slugishness of the cattle, and a slight stiffness of the legs. Upon careful examination of the cattle we would notice the lips, mucous membrane lining of the mouth and the end of the tongue, red and inflamed; or, if the disease had progressed further we would see some ulceration of the mu cous membranes of the mouth tongue and lips, and a bad odor present.
