### Sign Posts On Country Roads

At the annual meeting of the N. C. Good Roads Association held in Charlotte recently the matter of sign posts on country roads was widely discussed. It seems that it is the duty of County Commissioners to furnish these signs and the duty of overseers to put them up and maintain them.

In this matter, which is a sure sign of progressiveness, the extreme mountain counties are far ahead of us. At every Cross Road is the sign giving the name of and distance to the prominent places as well as a mile post every mile. This is not only an advantage to the residents of a county but the stranger gets a decided advantage from it.

Very few counties in the state have as few sign posts as Yadkin. The law in regard to this, which is found in the Revised of 1905, Section 2722, and reads as follows:

Overseers shall cause to be set up, at the forks of their respective roads, a post or posts, with arms pointing the way of each road, with plain and durable directions to the most public places to which they lead, and with the number of miles from that place as near as can be computed; and every overseer who shall, for ten days after notice of his appointment, neglect to do so and to keep the same in repair shall forfeit and pay for every such neglect ten dollars.

### Bonds For Statesville Air Line Railroad

Yadkin County Townships Liberty, Boonville and Deep Creek did their duty towards voting bonds to the amount of \$90,000, for the Statesville Air Line Railroad. What more can we do towards helping build the road and why not contract so the road could be built in 12 months instead of 12 years. ### Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards Arrested in Des Moines Iowa

Des Moines, Sept. 14 - Sidna Allen leader of the Hillsville Va., Allen gang, and Wesley Edwards, his companion, were captured here today by detectives from Roanoke Va.

Edwards was captured on a street car, Allen was captured earlier in the day. The love of Edwards for Miss Maude Irola, of Mt. Airy, N. C., led to his capture. A visit of Edwards to the girl at her home and the loss of a letter accidentally put the detectives on his trail.

The fugitives had been Des Moines since last April. Allen worked as a carpenter and Edwards with a city paving gang under assumed names.

Allen was arrested at his boarding house. The arrest was made just after Miss Irola stepped into the boarding house to meet Edwards, whom she expected to marry tonight. He was covered with a revolver and did not resist. Miss Irola arrived this morning unaware that detectives were following her.

### WILSON WOULD REPEAL ALL PROTECTIVE TARIFF LAWS.

The following is taken from an address delivered by Professor Woodrow Wilson before the tariff board in 1882, showing his view then on the question of the tariff and the distinct announcement of his position as a free trader, opposed to all tariffs except merely for the purpose of raising revenue:

"But the danger of imposing protective duties is that when the policy is once embarked upon it cannot be easily receded from. Protection is nothing more than a bounty, and when we offer bounties to manufacturers they will enter into industry and build up interests and when at a later day we seek to overthrow this protective tariff we must hurt somebody and of course there is objection. They will say, 'Thousands of men will be thrown out of employment and hundreds of people will lose their capital.' This seems very plausible; but I maintain that manufacturers are made better manufacturers whenever they are thrown upon their own resources and left to the natural competition of trade."

"Protection also hinders commerce immensely. The English people do not send as many goods to this country as they would if the duties were not so much and in that way there is a restriction of commerce and we are building up manufacturers here at the expense of commerce. We are holding ourselves aloof from foreign countries in effect and saying, 'We are sufficient to ourselves; we wish to trade, not with England, but with each other.' I maintain that it is not only a pernicious system, but a corrupt system."

### "By Commissioner Garland:

"Q. Are you advocating the repeal of all tariff laws?"

"A. Of all protective tariff laws; of establishing a tariff for revenue merely. It seems to me very absurd to maintain that we shall have free trade between different portions of this country and at the same time shut ourselves out from free communication with other producing countries of the world. If it is necessary to impose restrictive duties on goods brought from abroad it would seem to me as a matter of logic, necessary to impose similar restrictions on goods taken from one state of this Union to another. That follows as a necessary consequence; there is no escape from it."

## ALLENS TO DIE NOVEMBER 22

### Sentence Of Death Passed Yesterday On Claude and Floyd

Wytheville, Va. Sept. 11.—When adjournment was taken at noon today in the trial of Victor Allen for alleged participation in the Hillsville court house murders, Judge Staples passed sentence on Floyd Allen and Claude Allen, who were found guilty of first degree murder on the same charge, and fixed November 22 as the date for the execution.
