New Lawrence Hospital is Growing Popular

To Prevent Diphtheria

As your county quarantine officer, I wish to call the attention of every mother in this county to diphtheria. The number of cases of this disease being reported to the State Board of Health is on the increase throughout the state. No epidemic is reported at any place, but one may occur anywhere. We are entering our diphtheria season.

To prevent diphtheria, mothers should take their children between six months and six years old to their family doctor for three doses of toxir-antitoxin. As it takes about six weeks for the effect of this treatment to be established, no time should be lost.

Mothers should also bear in mind that croup and sore throat kill too many babies to let a grannie, your neighbor, or themselves treat a child. Assume no risk! Call your doctor, and if he advises diphtheria antitoxin, let him use it.

If the parents of this county would follow these suggestions, money and lives would be saved and sickness prevented.
