Davie County Man Dies in Guatemala

Postmaster N. L. Cranford, of Winston-Salem, received a letter last week from A. C. Frost, American consul stationed at Guatemala City, Guatemala, stating that Dr. Frank M. Johnson, a dentist, native of America died on June 20, 1921.

Dr. Johnson was a native of Davie county, this state, and was practicing his profession at Mocksville 17 years ago, when he mysteriously disappeared and up to this time nothing had been heard from him. Dr. Johnson's sudden departure was a few months after his marriage to the daughter of a minister. The wife, one daughter, and a brother and sister survive. According to Consul Frost, Dr. Johnson married after going to Guatemala and a son and daughter by that union are now in school at New Orleans, La.

Death of Bertha Spillman

Bertha, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Spillman, of Route 2, died Tuesday morning after an illness of only a few days with membranous croup.

The funeral and interment was at Forbush Baptist church yesterday at 10 o'clock, services being conducted by Rev. S. F. Morton.

\$443,313,000 in Gold Brought in This Year

New York.—Gold to the value of \$443,313,000 has been brought to the United States from foreign countries since the beginning of the present year, while exports of the metal for the same period have amounted to but \$10,720,000, according to figures made public by the federal reserve board. Of this amount \$325,230,000 was in foreign bullion, \$67,417,000 in foreign coins, \$25,845,000 in gold ore and base bullion and \$24,233,000 in United States gold coin.

Importations of silver also showed substantial increase. During the first eight months of this year silver valued at \$1,270,000 has arrived here from Germany.

EXHIBITS A TIBETAN SHRINE

New York Museum Shows Figure of Buddhist Saint of Olden Time.

New York.—A Tibetan temple shrine, complete in every detail, has been placed on temporary exhibition in the American Museum of Natural History, and for the first time students of Tibetan culture are enabled to study the influences of Indian and Chinese culture on Tibetan religious art.

Most of the collection was looted from Tibetan temples by a Chinese expedition which penetrated Tibet after the British under Sir Francis Younghusband had left Lhasa, the Forbidden City, Alexander Scott, a British artist who made his home for twenty-six years at Darjeeling, India, on the highway to Tibet, owns the greater part of the collection. He had wheeled his way into the country and was on familiar terms with Tibetan lamas and priests before the Younghusband expedition fought its way over the Himalayas and forced Tibetan recognition of the British empire.

The central figure is that of Padma (teacher) Sambhava, the first teacher of Buddhism in Tibet 800 years ago. Padma Sambhava wears a tiger-tipped with a cinnabar feather. The vulture being the highest flyer of the birds, the feather indicates that the doctrine of this saint is the highest and most aspiring.

MEET AROUND 'ROCK OF AGES'

Pilgrims in England Honor Composer at Spot That Inspired Great Hymn.

Burrington, Combe, Somerset, England.—The rock visualized by Augustus Toplady, when he was inspired to compose the hymn, "Rock of Ages," stands just outside this village and a great demonstration to perpetuate his memory was held there on the August bank holiday. Toplady is said to have taken refuge on the rock from a severe storm which was sweeping over the gorge on the edge of which the rock stands, and, while waiting for it to pass over he was led to compose the hymn.

The great pilgrimage to the rock was organized under the auspices of the Church of England but a Salvation Army band also took part. The 10,000 people present, some of whom were perched on jutting rocks on the side of the gorge, took part in the singing of the hymn. It was also decided that a memorial to Toplady should be placed on the rock.

Falls Into Deep Well

Andrew Johnson, of Harmony Iredell county, was taken to a Statesville hospital last week in serious condition as the result of falling into a deep well.

A plank broke with him, and he fell 45 feet, his back striking the wall. He fell into six feet of water in the well and suffered some from swallowing water.

Chicago Home Brew Explosion Brings Bomb Squad Out and Alarms Neighborhood.

Chicago.—"The Oak Park Trust and Savings bank has been bombed." This message to the police sent shotgun squads and all available policemen scurrying to the bank.

The building was surrounded and all persons in it held prisoners. The bank employees were in a panic. There had been a tremendous explosion but it had not been traced. The police investigated. In a flat over the bank occupied by August Schmidt, a clerk, they discovered destruction. The kitchen sustained the full force of the explosion, which came from a virulent batch of "home brew." The explosion aroused people in the next flat. They sent the message to the police.

CAPT. LAKE TO RAISE SHIPS

Submarine Inventor Builds a Twin-Hulled Vessel to Recover Sunken Cargoes.

Bridgeport, Conn.—Capt. Simon Lake, inventor of the even keel type of submarine, who has been experimenting in Long Island sound a year with a twin-hulled salvage boat built to recover sunken cargoes, expects to leave for England next spring to take up with the British admiralty plans to raise hundreds of merchant vessels sunk in the war.

Mr. Lake said he was approached by a New York agent of the British admiralty with an offer of financial backing to the extent of \$1,000,000 if he will undertake to construct in England salvage boats capable of raising the 20,000,000 tons of shipping sunk off the coasts of Great Britain.

"Our experiments have shown that the suction salvager apparatus we have been using in the Sound is practical," he said. "With the diving tube attached to our twin-hulled boat we have located sixteen sunken boats."

Stray Deer in Town Harbor, Seattle, Wash.—A stray deer, quitting his wily retreat in Meager island in Lake Washington, here swam almost into the heart of the city of Seattle recently. The crew of a lake steamer sighted the fugitive and gave chase. When the deer had nearly reached the city dock, a posse thrown from the boat caught him. He was turned over to the municipal zoo here.

Poison, Mistaken for Wine, Kills Four. Chicago.—Six men working in a railroad freight house discovered a paper carton labeled "Wine—34 per cent." It was part of a shipment of cotabium, a deadly poison. The men drank three of the twelve bottles in the carton. Four of them died in agony, and the other two are fighting for their lives.

John C. Clark was found dead in his room at his home in Winston-Salem Sunday morning. He was a traveling salesman. Burial was at Danville Monday.

The general railroad strike which was to have taken place last Sunday morning was called off Friday by the union.

The Asheville Chamber of Commerce has started a move for a pardon board for North Carolina. The board is to be composed of five men, with the lieutenant governor as president or chairman.

Evelyn Nesbit, formerly Mrs. Harry K. Thaw, attempted suicide in New York last week. She took the morphine route but still lives.

Tampa, Fla., was struck by a tropical hurricane last week. Two people were killed and millions of dollars of damage done to property.

At Lexington, Ga., last week Frank Tidwell was stabbed to death by his brother-in-law, Fred Arnold. The men had quarreled over the burial expenses of Tidwell's mother, who died some month's ago.

Several manufacturing plants at Durham closed down last week on account of the short age of water.

The American Legion met in Kansas City Monday for its third annual convention. Marshal Foch, of France, is attending the convention.

Sheriff Shelton, of Stokes county, has resigned. Steps had been taken to impeach him, as he was charged of being too friendly with John Barleycorn.

Mrs. Vanderbilt Pays \$30,-684.43 Taxes

The Buncombe county officers were enriched Sunday in the tune of \$30,684.43, a check signed by Mrs. George W. Vanderbilt being handed County Tax Collector Collins in full payment of the taxes on the Vanderbilt property located in Buncombe county. By making payment Saturday Mrs. Vanderbilt saved one per cent on the total taxes.

The total holdings in Buncombe are valued at more than four million dollars, while part of the holdings in other counties. The Vanderbilt holdings are mostly invested in stocks and bonds, and therefore not taxable in Buncombe county. The city taxes were not paid Saturday.
