BERLIN. Oct. 8.-German raiders in the last 24 hours answered last night's British raid on Berlin by dumping on London 40 times the 10 tons of bombs which fell on the German capital, informed militry sources reported tonight. informants said the British dropped 10 tons of bombs on Berlin in their heaviest raid of the war and that the 40-for-1 nazi reply was directed at the London area.

TOKIO, Oct. 8.—Britain's decision to reopen the Burma road, China's somewhat shaky route for military supplies from Europe and America, was viewed by authoritative quarters today as a new instance of British-American co-operation in applying pressure on Japan. Circles close to the government expressed belief that Britain had acted after consultation with the United States and in answer to Japan's military alliance with Germany and Italy.

Attorney J. T. Reece was named as the appeal agent and Dr. H. A. Brandon is examining physician. October 16 has been set aside as registration day for all male persons between the ages of 21 and 35 inclusive. These registrants will be divided into classes and those without dependants will be placed on the call list. Of these there will be some in classes who will be deferred where their places in business cannot be easily filled.

On registration day it is estimated about 100 persons will be needed to register all between the ages stated, which is about 15 per cent of the population or about 3000 persons in Vadkin county. One person can registrar about 30 persons in a day, it is
