

FRENCH PEOPLE Joyner Is President

Not to Declare War on England Under Any Circumstances Is Report

CONFER WITH HITLER

Triple defiance of reported axis pressure on France to join the war against Great Britain has emerged following a mysterious meeting "somewhere in France" between Adolf Hitler and French Vice Premier Pierre Laval

The vanquished republic will undertake "no military, naval or aerial action against England." a French government spokesman said.

"France will not declare war on England under any circumstances," he added.

LONDON, Oct. 22-A deadly wall of shellfire and British "night-hawk" fighters reinforced by new American planes last night strangled the fury of Adolf Hitler's air siege of London and all-clear signals sounded shortly before midnight. It was perhaps the quietest of London's 46 nights of assault and for a while early today this world's bombtorn metropolis enjoyed a strange respite from death and destruction. 
