# IN NEW FIGHT

English Attacking Series of Italian Forts

ITALIANS MAY ESCAPE

London Calls Upon R. A. F. to Patrol Atlantic Sea Lanes for Raiders

ARE TO COMBAT SUBS

London, Dec. 11-British forces have trapped parts of two crack Italian divisions in the Egyptian desert and have hopes of surrounding the entire divisions, numbering perhaps 30,000 men, military informants said today.

The chance of the Italians to escape encirclement depends on the extent of their motorization -the speed with which they are able to withdraw-provided the British are able to hold their new positions, it was said.

For the present the British were reported to be attacking a series of defensive forts in preparation for a drive against the main Fascist army in the coastal zone between Sidi Barrani and Sollum, on the Libyan frontier, it was reported.

British attacks on some of these forts, called perimeter camps, around Sidi Barrani, already have succeeded, military informants said.

Fighting was proceeding today, they said, in the neighborhood of the important camp at Maktila 15 miles west of Sidi Barrani.

British Empire motorized units had driven a wedge through the Italians south of Sidi Barrani, it was reported, and in that way trapped thousands of men by cutting them off from the main Italian body farther west.

Pockets of Italian troops, still resisting in the remaining desert forts, are now under attack, informants said.
