Sanford, August 3.—Sanford Juniors are making preparations for entertaining one of the biggest and best meetings of the State Council, Junior Order United American Mechanics held in several years. On Tuesday, August 17, Juniors from all sections of the Old North State, from the mountains to the seashore, and from the Virginia to the South Carolina line, will turn their faces towards the Lee county convention town. 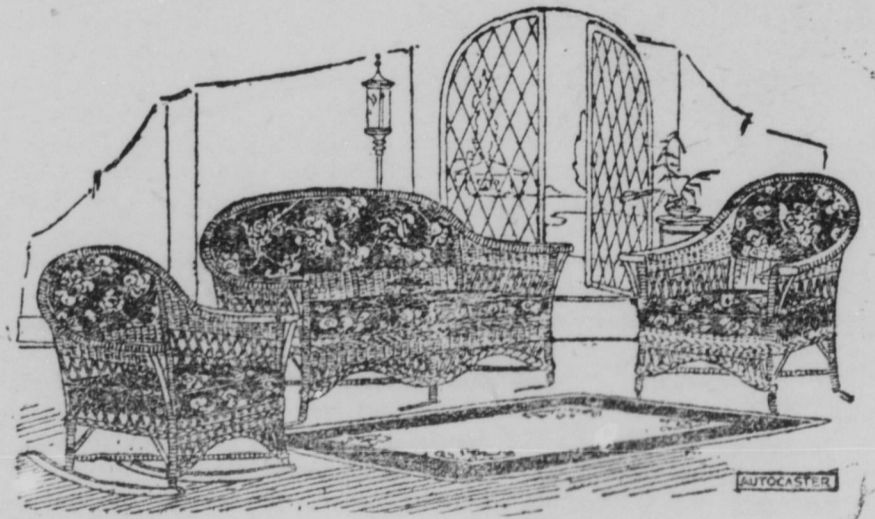
