

## Four Areas To Receive Aid

There are four major areas in North Carolina in which the Resettlement Administrations Land Utilization Division plans to demonstrate the value, proper use and conservation of the state's natural resources, say James M. Gray, of Raleigh, regional director in charge. Gray who has spent 25 years studying such problems listed: eroded portions of the mountains; hilly cotton and tobacco regions retired from cultivation and reforested as well as the cut-over timber land and smaller work of the same along the coastal plain. In most regions this will be gradual.

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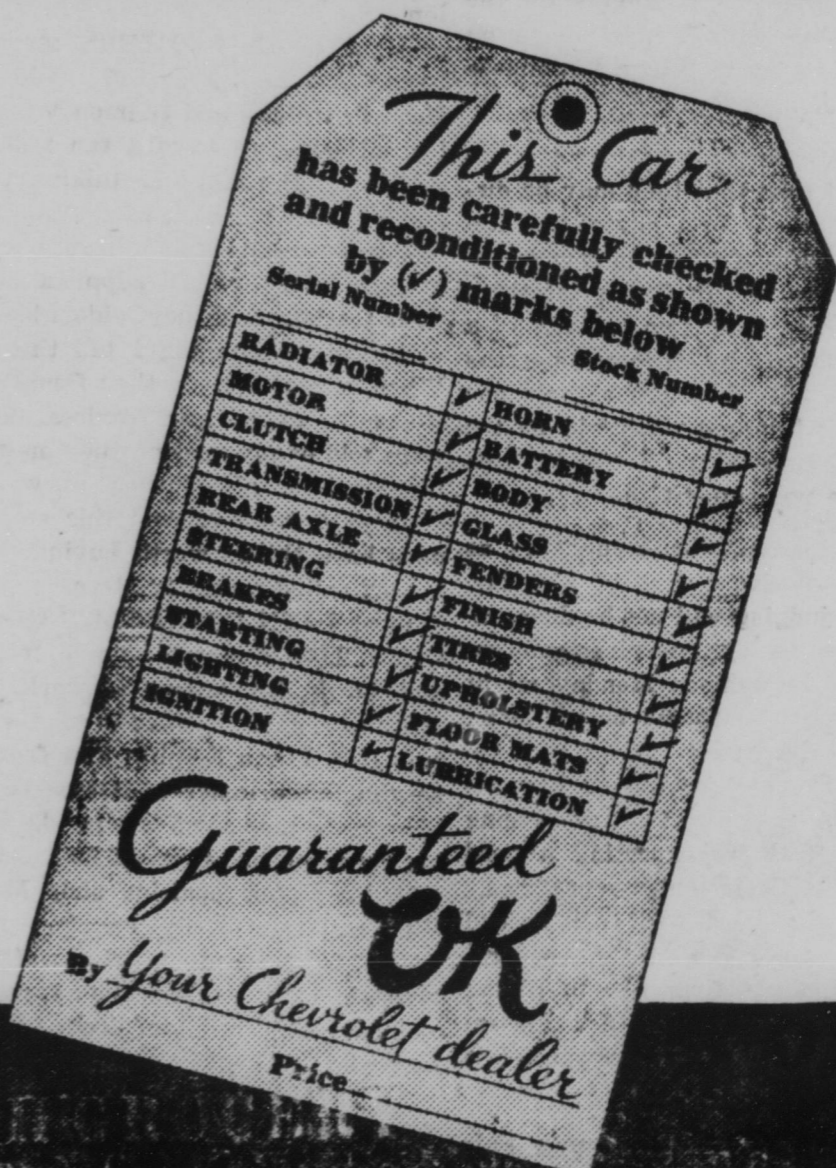
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
