**Wendell Fair  
Opens Tuesday**

The Big East Wake Fair will open  
their doors for the annual fair Tuesday  
when all the Kiddies over the County  
will be the guests of the Fair Assn. of  
Wendell. Plans this year are bigger and  
a Half Mile Midway will be one of the  
big features with the Famous Bantley  
Shows on the Pike. The Bantley Show  
is one of the finest in show business  
featuring 12 big Shows and 8 rides; all  
clean and high class and will open all  
shows and rides to the kiddies Tuesday  
for 5 cents from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m.
