PATIENTS AT DUKE HOSPITAL

Durham, N. C., April 29—Seventy-five counties of the state made the lot of patients in Duke hospital easier during the past year by assisting in their care. The help given by counties ranged from \$2 to more than \$9,000, according to the number of patients sent from each county.

The hospital's report shows that \$509,797.80 was spent on patients or \$4.51 for each patient each day. Patients themselves were able to pay but 53.1 percent of their hospital expenses. Nearly \$23,000 was paid for them by their home counties.

Patients from Wake county were given 4,383 days of care, of which \$11,123.05 was paid by patients themselves, \$118.80 by the county or city, \$288.10 by others, and \$8,237.38 by Duke hospital.

Born to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Agans a son, April 25. Mrs. Agans was formerly Miss Erselle Starnes.

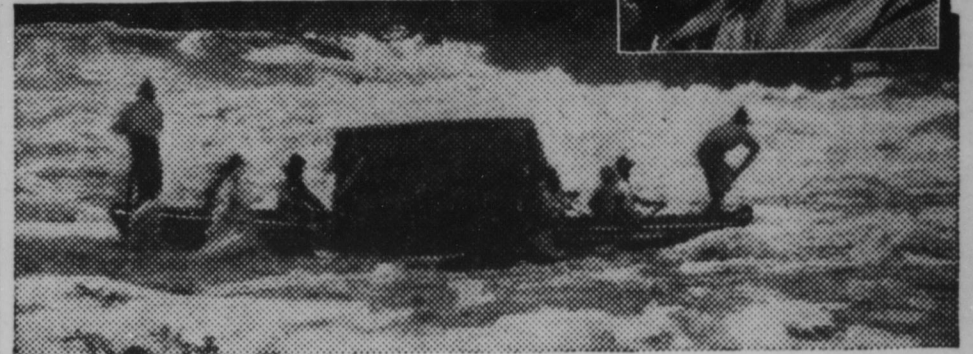
