PRIMING TOBACCO

How often should tobacco be primed to insure a quality leaf?

This depends upon the maturity of the leaves and seasonal conditions, but usually the plants should be primed at least once a week during normal seasons. Only uniform, ripe, well-developed leaves should be primed. Begin the harvest as soon as the bottom leaves turn yellow. The first leaves can bepulled a little greener, if the leaf is matured, than at any other priming. A uniformity in pulling and handling tobacco will add as much to the quality as any other one factor. Precautions should therefore be taken not to bruise the leaves in handling.
