PRIMING TOBACCO

How often should tobacco be primed to insure a quality leaf? This depends upon the maturity of the leaves and seasonal conditions, but usually the plants should be primed at least once a week during normal seasons. Only uniform, ripe, well-developed leaves should be primed. Begin the harvest as soon as the bottom leaves turn yellow. The first leaves can be pulled a little greener, if the leaf is matured, than at any other priming. A uniformity in pulling and handling of tobacco will add as much to the quality as any other one factor. Precautions should therefore be taken not to bruise the leaves in handling.
