THREE ERWINGOS TO BE AT FIVE COUNTY FAIR

For years audiences throughout the world have thrilled to the intrepid mastery over the ether of the Three Erwingos, whose sensational performance is based on an entirely new conception of aerial art.

Suspended 60 feet in the air, the Erwingos, composed of two attractive girls and a male in support, proceed to defy the laws of gravity in their finely wrought gymnastic creation. SAFETY FIRST

(We reprint another safety letter received from the Texas Co. We believe all motorists would do well to follow the following advice. —Editor)

ALL EMPLOYEES, CONSIGNEES AND DISTRIBUTORS

When it comes to icy surfaces, it is hardly necessary to enlarge upon this phase: you know what to expect. Fog causes lots of trouble, too, and added precautions should be taken.

Report Malaria At Once

Raleigh — "In order to properly control malaria, now a reportable disease, it is highly important that the State Board of Health know where each case occurs", said Dr. J. C. Knox, State Epidemiologist.

"During the past few years there has been an increase in the incidence of malaria in North Carolina, reflected in an increased number of deaths, and also shown by every other method for determining its prevalence. While the disease was not declared reportable until May 25 of this year, and the total number of cases for any previous year or series of years cannot, therefore, be accurately determined, yet mortality records show there were 150 deaths from malaria in North Carolina in 1936, as compared with 94 in 1935. Provisional reports for the first half of 1937 also show there is an increase in the number of deaths so far this year, as compared with the corresponding period of 1936.

"The procedure to be followed in reporting malaria is the same as that used in reporting other notifiable diseases. Each case should be reported on the regular card furnished by the local health department or obtained from the State Board of Health. Each of these, bearing full information, should be mailed to the county or city health officer, or quarantine officer who in turn forwards the cards to the State Board of Health.

"Considerable work has been done for the control of malaria in

North Carolina, including the recent digging of 4,867,458 feet, or 22 miles, of ditches, draining 12,416 acres of malaria breeding area. Prompt reporting of every case will greatly aid in determining the incidence of malaria and show where there is greatest need for extended work looking toward control."

HAVE YOU A LITTLE PHOBIA?

(An editorial from the Rotarian Magazine)

Do you have a phobia (one of those fashionable, unreasonable fears)? Life today is hardly complete without at least one. To be very elementary, take claustrophobia, the dread of enclosed spaces. Do the walls of your office oppress you? Would you bounce oaths at them or kick them? If you do, go ahead. Everyone expects it, for you are a claustrophobe. You run away screaming when you see a furry animal or insect. Then you are a doraphobe. Say you wish your wife

And at your club luncheon do you blench when the waitress slops coffee into your saucer? If you do it's quite possible that you're a spillumjavaphobe or some such thing. Perhaps you've developed the morbid fear of suddenly being called upon to speak—or of not being called upon. For such there is no doubt a name.

But for one phobia that now and then disturbs some clubs and civic organizations there is a real and recognized name. It is ergasiophobia, the fear of work. When a short-handed committee chairman approaches you, do you creep down into your socks? Don't, if you want to break your phobia. Instead, say (however meekly), "Wall, I'll try it this once." For the best way to sunder an ergasiophobia, the psychotherapist would say, is to recall when and how it first began, to note how silly it was to start hating work, and then to begin doing the very thing you've been fearing this long while.

WOOD HOUSES WILL GIVE GOOD SERVICE INDEFINITELY

There is no secret about long life and satisfactory service of wood in a house, according to engineers at the Forest Products laboratory, Madison, Wis., a section of the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. The greatest destroyers of wood in buildings are decay and termites. In most parts of the United States it is a very simple matter to build a house in such a manner as to keep them out.

Decay in wood is caused by the growth of very low forms of plants, called fungi, that use the wood for food. However, fungi can not grow without moisture. Even the so-called dry-rot fungi must have moisture, although they have the ability to carry moisture many feet from the ground or other sources of supply, and hence are able to destroy wood that appears to be dry. To avoid decay do not allow wood to be in contact with the ground or close enough to become damp. Do not place wood floors over damp concrete or let wood posts extend down into basement floors. If your home is to have no basement, provide good ventilation beneath it to remove the stagnant air that would otherwise carry moisture from the ground to the wood. Do not allow moisture to accumulate from leaky roofs or defective flashing around windows, doors, or chimneys.

When it is impracticable to avoid conditions favorable to decay in certain parts of the house, it may be well to build these parts of wood that has high resistance to

decay, such as heartwood or one may use other wood treated with a suitable preservative. This prevents the growth of fungi in wood by poisoning their food supply.

Fortunately the precautions that are effective against decay are, for the most part, effective against termites. Well treated woods are safe from their attack. When termites are particularly active they may build their tunnels up the

foundation of the house. This can be prevented by constant watchfulness and destruction of all tunnels as fast as they are built. In certain protection is provided by metallic termite shields. These shields consist of sheets of metal between the sills and the foundations that extend outward and downward from the top of the foundation. Shields must also be placed at all pipes and conduits.

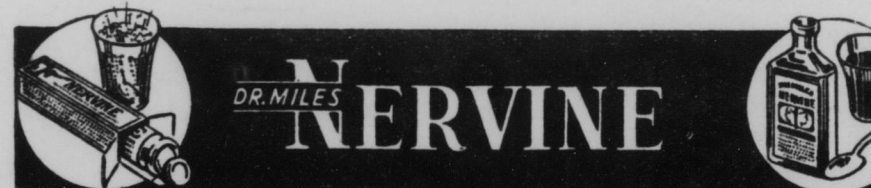
