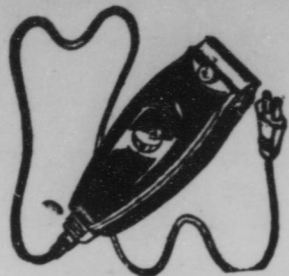


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Short Items Of General Interest

Cotton went up about ten points—forty to fifty cents a bale—on Tuesday's trading. That brings it up to a little above eight cents a pound, which is the equivalent of about five cents on the gold dollar standard.

Thirty-five persons were killed and more than a hundred injured in a train wreck in Scotland last Friday.

Soviet Russia had an election Sunday, the first in many years. More than 90,000,000 people voted and the vote of confidence in the Stalin government was almost unanimous. However, there is nothing important about that since there was only one ticket to be voted and failure to vote it would likely have been punished by death.

John W. Hanes, member of the prominent Winston-Salem family of bankers and manufacturers, and himself a Wall Street broker, has been named by President Roosevelt as a member of the Securities Exchange Commission. The other new member is Jerome Frank, Appointment of Haynes and Frank is considered a gesture toward conciliation of the big bankers and at the same time an indication that Mr. Roosevelt means to have the laws governing stock exchange operations rigidly enforced.

Two unusual surgical operations reported the past week are of more than professional interest. In Ned Orleans the cornea of an eye was taken from an old man and given to a young man who had lost an eye in an accident. This is the first such operation ever attempted and early reaction is very favorable. In Baltimore a surgical attempt is being made to graft a lot of flesh from a Negro boy onto a Negro girl who was badly burned. The boy's body is being slit from shoulder to hip and a "rope of flesh" with the blood still circulating is being joined to a similar incision in the girl's side. When the two bodies grow together they will be separated and the girl will be able to function normally, if surgical hopes are realized.

Congress is considering submitting the the people an amendment to the federal constitution requiring a popular vote on declaration of war. At present congress can declare war at the request of the President. Under the proposed amendment the question would have to be submitted to the people.

Olin Sanders, captain of the guard at South Carolina state prison in Columbia, was stabbed to death by several convicts last week when they attempted a jail break. The prisoners got Capt. Sanders locked in a small room with them and then issued an ultimatum to other guards that unless a car was furnished them to

leave they would kill him. Prison officials sent for the Governor and after a short conference they decided that the prisoners would kill Sanders in any event and Sanders himself asked them not to get the car. When the rebellious convicts refused all efforts of amnesty and all pleas of the governor, a company of state militia bombarded them with tear gas bombs. When they struggled out of the room Capt. Sanders was left dying on the floor. Col. J. S. Wilson, superintendent of the

prison, is a brother of Mrs. D.D. Williams, of Raleigh.

Eugene Weidman, called the modern "Bluebeard," has confessed the killing of six women in Paris, and officials are still hunting bodies and believe that several more have died at his hands. Weidman is a professional dancer and is said to have killed his women companions and robbed them so that he could have money for dancing lessons.

Hiram Lodge of Masons celebrated its 137th anniversary this week. Past Grand Master Timberlake was the principal speaker at the open meeting held Wednesday night, and many Masons from neighboring lodges were present.
