Heavy Rains

With more rain falling on Monday morning than fell during the entire month of August, fields and roads were badly washed, mud was and slippery, and many were cars that got stuck. One youth thinking that he needed help to his Ford unearthed, said he had never felt worse about it had he and others gone into the same mud that day. The day was not hot but there was a touch of the air with the extreme humidity. In other nearby sections the rains were heavier than here; but here the reverse was true.

Phillip Bunn Is Promoted

The promotion of Phillip R. Bunn from assistant manager to manager of the Charlotte District North Carolina Employment Service constituted a feature in the Charlotte News on September 18. Mr. Bunn holds the position of being the youngest manager of the largest district of the North Carolina Employment Service.

Son of Mr. J. G. Bunn, he is well known in this community, having graduated from Wakelon School in 1928. He later attended Wake Forest College, graduating in 1932. Upon leaving college he entered government service as supervisor and statistical assistant in the office of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in Raleigh.

At that time he has worked extensively as statistician and manager for the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, state and supervisor for the Works Administration, state for the Emergency Relief Administration, and field supervisor for the Works Progress Administration, all in Raleigh. He entered State Employment Service in Greensboro in March 1936, as statistician, and was promoted to assistant director in September 1937.

To Hold Rural Carrier Exam

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Zebulon, N. C.

The examination will be held at Raleigh, N. C.

Receipt of applications will close on Oct. 7, 1938.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 30 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$20 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 30 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists, who have been actually domiciled there for six months next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.
