APPLICANTS WARNED AGAINST FRAUD

Durham, Nov. 15.—Dr. Frank T. de Vyver, supervisor of merit examinations for the North Carolina Unemployment Compensation Commission, issued the following statement today:

"My attention has been called to advertisements by correspondence schools and coaching schools who purport to have 'inside information' on examinations to be given in January.

I wish to make it emphatically clear that no individual and no group has been furnished information not supplied to all applicants. No sample questions on the examinations are available.

The fact is that the examinations have not yet been prepared. The research material filed in the North Carolina libraries consists of copies of the laws and bulletins with which applicants may be expected to be familiar. This material does not include copies of examinations or sample questions.

This statement is issued as a warning. The examinations will not be prepared until December. Any claims to "inside information" are fraudulent and any money invested in response to such claims will be wasted."
