

## LIQUOR SALES

The 27 counties in North Carolina that permit the sale of whiskey, points out The Biblical Recorder, had legal sales of liquor amounting to \$6,798,407.66 for the 12 months ending June 30, 1938. These counties have a combined population of 923,324. The per capita sale of liquor in this part of the state therefore amounted to \$7.53.

Some of this money, of course, went to the state in the form of taxes.

If such a sum as that represented by this more than six million dollars could have been turned into some channel for the betterment of humanity, how much better off these 923,324 people would be.—Exchange.

## TOBACCO CONTROL DEFEATED


