After effecting an organization the young men put on a trade boosting campaign by offering through the merchants and other business people of the town tickets. From these were drawn each Saturday numbers giving the successful winners prizes ranging from \$1.00 to \$100.00. This campaign no doubt helped business. It brought hundreds of people to Zebulon each Saturday whether they traded much or not.

The JC's have not yet announced their "project" for 1940, but no doubt they will have something good for the town and its business. Only one thing we believe would be better and that is an organization that actively engages all the business men of the town. Why not organize a business men's club, making any one eligible to membership? Or perhaps a general Chamber of Commerce would be better.
