FEEDING BABY CHICKS

As soon as the chicks are placed under the canopy they should be fed buttermilk or sour skim milk and have access to dry mash and water. Cooked infertile eggs, left over from the first candling, will also give excellent results. The mash should be fed in hoppers and placed near the source of heat. Grain feed may be given after the first seven to ten days. This should be fed two or three times a day and placed in the mash hoppers on top of the mash. It is very essential that plenty of mash hopper space be supplied so that the chicks may all eat at the same time.
