## BINGO PARTY

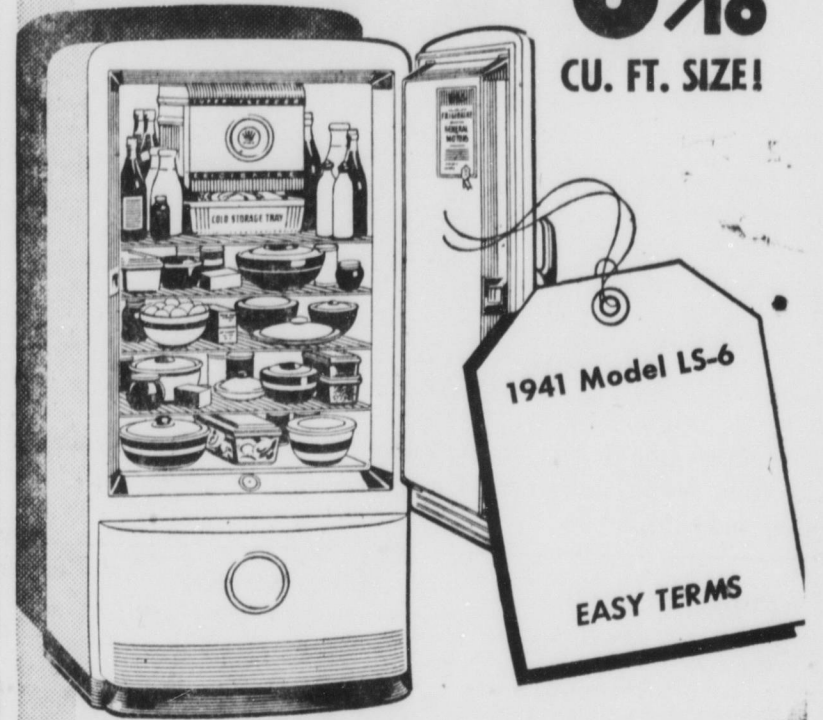

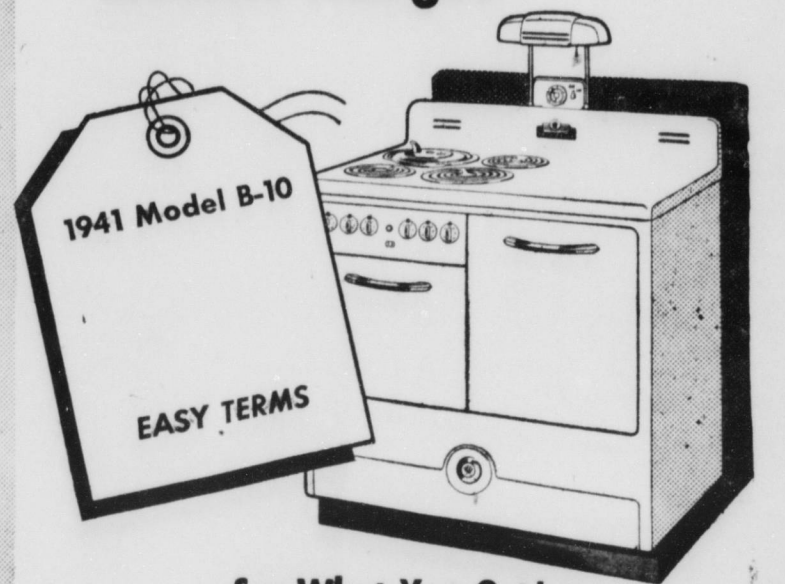
