> > Grade C (Standard)—Grade C canned food is of good quality, but differs from the other two grades in that the products are not so uniform in color, size, or degree of maturity. The fruit, as in Grade B, is packed in either sirup or water. The vegetables are less tender, but in some cases have more food value because they are more fully mature than the products in the higher grades.
