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## This, That and the Other

Years ago in Newton I learned to make what they called flummery. It is one of the simplest desserts possible, but is good. You use berry juice, or cherry juice, and I also press through the colander all the pulp that will go. Bring the juice and the pulp to a boil, sweetening as desired, if the sugar holds out. Thicken with corn starch or flour moistened with water or more juice and boil till thick. Spices or other flavoring may be added with a pinch of salt. When cold it should be almost stiff enough to stand alone. Serve with cream or milk. You may beat it as it cools, beating cream in, too; but it is hardly worth the extra time and trouble.

If blackberries are used for the flummery, you may give some to the baby.

I have found by experiment that you can use powdered saccharine in the recipe for "eight-day pickle", that has been published in this paper several times. Use barely a level teaspoonful in place of a pound of sugar and add spices as usual.

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## Zebulon Office Is Busy During Last Six Months; More Pay Is Now Given

On July 1 Zebulon was advanced to a second class post office. While the town has an unusual amount of mail, the three rural routes carry out thousands of letters and newspapers each week and bring other thousands in to be sent away. Also the Bunn post office is served through Zebulon.

The two clerks, Mrs. Douglas Finch and Miss Ruby Dawson now come under civil service regulations, working 40 hours a week with one day off. They also have a small salary increase. A substitute clerk will be employed who will work two days a week. The salary of postmaster Sexton is advanced from \$2,300. to \$2,400.

The number of hours in which the office is open has been increased. There are probably few towns in North Carolina, the size of Zebulon that have as high rating an amount of mail handled as in Zebulon.

And not as news, but something the public already knows, Zebulon has one of the most efficient and courteous post office forces to be found anywhere.

## Luther Massey Is Rotary Speaker

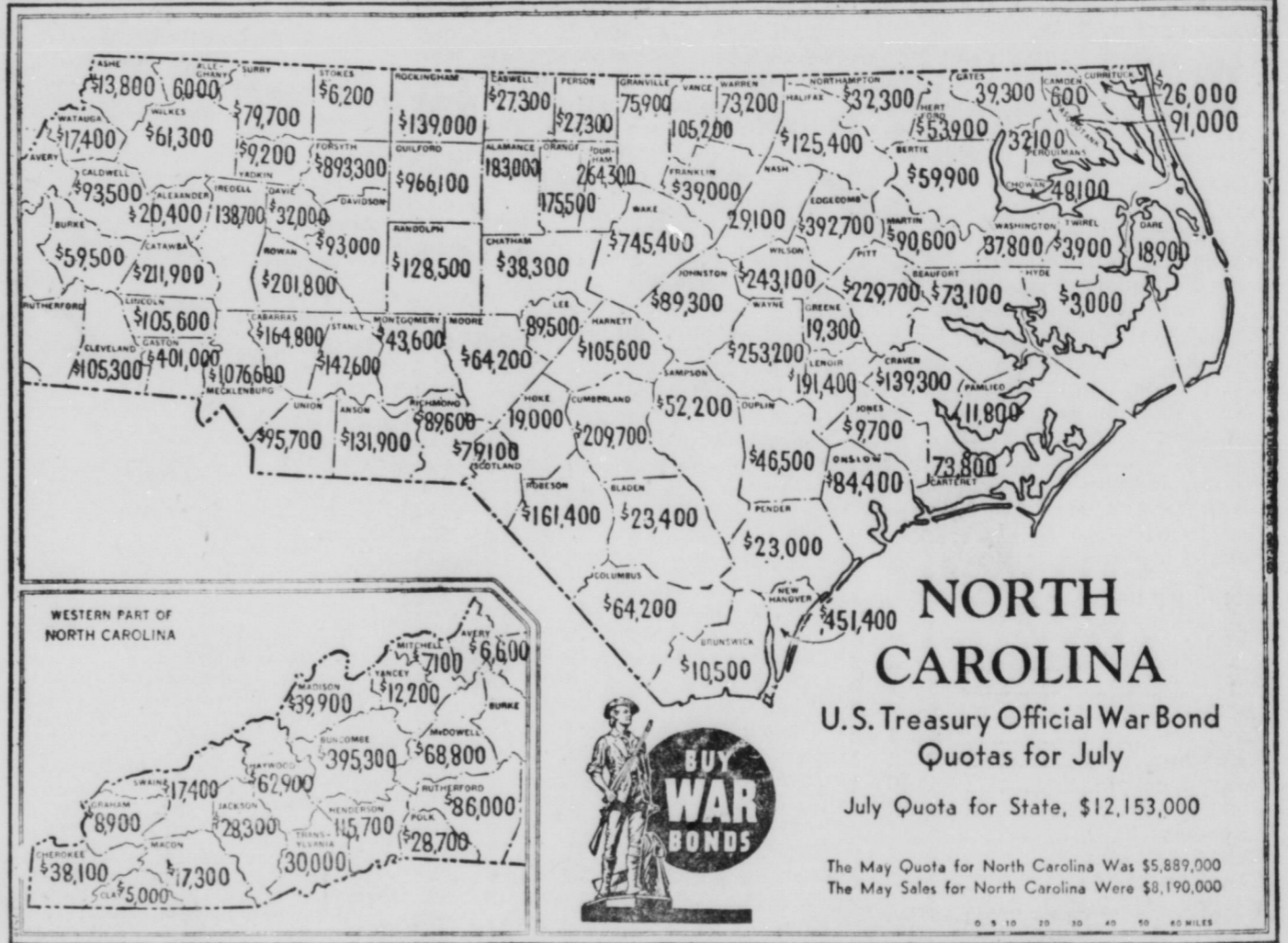
The Zebulon Rotary continues to hold its 100 percent meetings. Mrs. Luther Massey sang several selections which were much enjoyed.

The new gas registration for Zebulon and surrounding section will be made at Wakelon gymnasium on July 9, 10 and 11. Registration will be necessary for every one having a car if he expects to use that car after July 15.

It will be necessary for each applicant to bring his motor vehicle registration card. He must also know the year, model and bodytype of automobile. He will also need to be able to give the average daily or monthly mileage in which he uses the car. If the above information is written down so the registrar may easily record it, car owners will save time and trouble to themselves and the registrars.
