If you happen to get iron rust or mildew on a garment worth more than the trouble of getting the stain out, you can do a good job with lemon juice and salt on a sunny day. But be careful to wash this mixture out with clear water before putting any soap on; or you'll have another stain to work over. I learned this by experience.

One day last week, after using the pressure cooker to get every scrap of flavor from some soup bones — and nothing but bones — I decided to process three quarts of peaches in the cooker. When the twenty minutes time for processing the peaches was up, I thought it would make no difference if they stayed on the stove till I wasn't so busy. Tobacco Prospects In Various Belts

Raleigh, July 25.—Preliminary N. C. Department of Agriculture estimates of the State tobacco acreage, yield, and production and the percentage comparison with last year are as follows:

Middle and Old Belts: acres, 278,000—up 5 per cent; yield per acre, 950 pounds—down 8 per cent; production 264,100,000 lbs.—down 3 per cent.

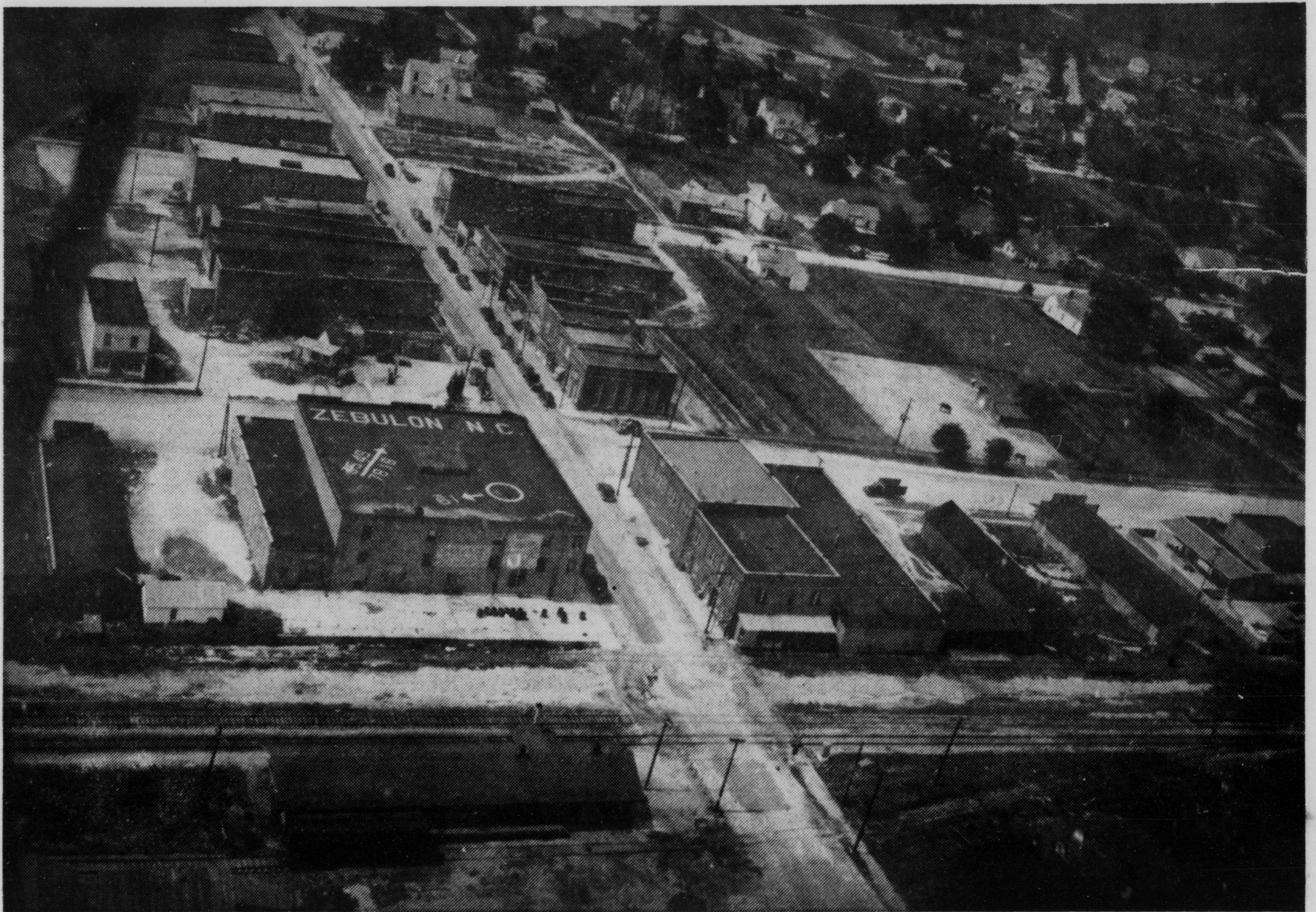
Eastern North Carolina: acres, 353,000 — up 4 per cent; yield per acre 1,125 — up 1 per cent; production 397,125,000 pounds — up 6 per cent.

Border Belt: acres, 83,000 — up 7 per cent; yield per acre, 1,150 pounds — same as last year; production, 95,450,000 — up 6 per cent.

Here, At Long Last, Is The Promised Picture Of The Zebulon Airmarker



Above is a picture of the Zebulon Airmarker and part of the Town of Zebulon as it looked from an altitude of 600 feet Sunday, July 22. The town name, Zebulon, N. C., is in letters 10 feet high across the front (top) of the Zebulon Supply Building; in the lower right is the circle and the figure 19 indicating that the nearest airport is 19 miles away in the direction indicated by the arrow; the long arrow indicates magnetic North and figures above it indicate the latitude, and the figures below the longitude in which the Town of Zebulon lies. Zebulon's main street runs approximately Northwest and Southeast. The new Record building can be seen on the right-hand side of the main street. The picture was made by Ted Davis from a Piper Cub plane owned and piloted by Milton Brannan.
