Of the ten leading tobaccogrowing counties in the country, seven are in North Carolina, with one each in Pennsylvania, South Carolina, and Virginia. In 1944, the ten leading counties reported large insurance companies and 281,681 acres in tobacco, about 17 other land holders by applying per cent of the Nation's 1,630,221
