Tragedy struck in Wakefield Monday afternoon when Warrenton Bolden, 13-year old Negro, drowned in Massey's Pond near the colored churches while swimming with four playmates. The young boy, a fifth-grader in school, had gone swimming immediately after eating his dinner after returning home from school.

Warrenton, called "Bobby" by his playmates, was swimming with Lyn Anderson, Preston Bethea, Hyatt Junior Brocks, and Wyles Painter. The four were playing "lifesaving," practicing pulling each other in to shore. The water was less than six feet deep.
