# Chamber of Commerce Boosting Zebulon's Beef-Raising Program

### Tons of Dried Eggs Are Given to Lunchrooms In North Carolina

A nutritional boost in the way of nearly a third of a million pounds of dried eggs has been given the school lunch program in North Carolina, which includes Wakelon, Wendell, Bunn, and Corinth-Holders Schools, the State Department of Agriculture has announced.

Nine solid carloads of dried eggs, totaling 310,000 poundsthe equivalent of about 950,000 dozen shell eggs-have been allocated to the State for school lunchrooms, to be used in enriching the noonday diet of North Carolina school children. The first shipments are expected this week.

U. S. Department of Agriculture this week. through its price supporting operations, and contributed to the lunchroom program. Distribution of such food commodities is handled by the State Department of Agriculture.

Mrs. Dewey Massey, manager of the cafeteria at Wakelon, stated that the dried eggs will prove a godsend, in view of the curtailed federal aid program for lunchrooms.
