**Tobacco Payment Change Announced**

Mr. Russell Powell, Chairman of Wake County Agricultural Conservation Committee, announced today that there will be no provision during the 1948-49 marketing year for the prepayment of penalty on the marketing of excess tobacco on the basis of the estimated production on the farm.

During prior marketing years, producers of excess tobacco were given the option of having the housemen at the time the tobacco penalty deducted by the warehouse marketed, or, of prepaying the penalty in advance on an estimate basis and making final settlement after all marketings from procedure necessitated the collection of additional penalty or making a refund in every case and made it difficult to determine eligibility for participation in the price support program of the Flue-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation.

Mr. Powell explained that during the 1948-49 marketing year, penalty will be deducted by the warehousemen or dealers in case marketing of each lot of tobacco of non-warehouse sale, upon the from any farm on which the acreage harvested exceeds the acreage allotment established for the farm.
